## IMPORTANT FROM NICARAGUA.

Walker's Position More Favorable.

The Costa Ricans Defeated on the San Juan by Col. Lockbridge.

DEFEAT OF THE ALLIES AT ST. GEORGE'S.

Arrival of Col. Titus with his Recruits at Greytown.

New ORLEANS, Tuesday, Feb. 17.
The steamer Texas, from Greytown 10th inst., has arrived at the Balize. The steamer Tennessee,

from New-York, with recruits and ammunition for WALKER, had arrived at Greytown, as also had Col. Titus with his recruits from Kansas,

Col. LOCKBINGE had proceeded up the river from Greytown to Cony's Point, at the mouth of the Sorapiqui, where he attacked and defeated 300 Costa Ricans, with a heavy loss to the enemy, and but a

Ricans, with a heavy loss to the enemy, and but a triffing one to himself. His steamer's machinery getting out of order he was obliged to put back to Punta Arenas. After repairing he proceeded back again and it was thought at Punta Arenas that he would in a

week be in full possession of the river,

The advices from Walker's position are to Fel'. 3, received at Panama, by the *Orizaba*. These advices are undoubtedly from Walker's agents, and are to be accredited accordingly. It is stated that the Allies, under Canas, had made their appearance in the vicinity of Rivas, but were driven back; also, that, on the 28th January, Gen. Henningsen, with 400 troops,

attacked 1,500 Costa Ricans at St. Georges, and, after driving them from their position, returned to Rivas.

WALKE'S whole force is rated at thirteen hundred men, of whom eleven hundred are fit for duty, and in good health and spirits, and having three month's

supply of provisions and ammunition.
