Arms Cache in Venezuela Called Foreign in Origin

CARACAS, Venezuela, Nov. 6
—A cache of arms discovered several days ago on a beach of the Paraguana Peninsula "came from abroad," a military spokesman said today.

The arms are being examined in the laboratories of the Defense Ministry. The serial numbers had been removed from the weapons.

It was said unofficially that the Government was gathering evidence to show that the arms were sent by boat from Cuba and were destined for guerrillas in the mountainous regions of Falcón state.

The cache consisted of three tons of war material and was buried in the sand. It included rifles, bazookas, machine guns, mortars, grenades, 7,500 rounds of ammunition and a large quantity of TNT.

Units of the National Guard were sent to patrol the coastline of Falcón. The cache was found near the village of Punta Macolla.
