

# TELEGRAPHIC INTELLIGENCE.

## Later from Nicaragua.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 18.—The steamship Texas has arrived, with advices from Nicaragua to the 10th inst.

The Tennessees, with recruits, arrived out safely, and Col. Titus joined Lockridge in an attack on 300 Costa Ricans, encamped, as previously reported, near the mouth of the river Serepagua. The Costa Ricans were defeated with large losses, and the assailants suffered little.

The steamer's machinery needed repairs, for which purpose they returned to Punta Arenas. The repairs needed had been completed, and the steamer returned to the scene of action. There was every probability that in a week the Nicaraguans would establish full command of the river.

From Gen. Walker we have accounts to the 30th, by the Orizaba from Panama. The enemy, under Canot, had appeared near Rivas, but had been driven back. On the 28th ult. Col. Hennegen, with 40 men, attacked the enemy, 1500 strong, at St. George's, and forced them to change position, but did not pursue. Walker's whole force at Rivas was 1300, of whom 1100 were fit for duty, and in excellent spirits and health, with ammunition for three months. This is confirmed by a private despatch from the agent of the Associated Press at Greytown, under date of 10th inst., the day of the departure of the Texas.
