Choice brands are firmly supported, with limited receipts; the sales are 12,500 bbls. at \$6 75@\$8 75 for superfine State; \$6 90@\$7 10 for extra do., \$6 75@\$7 50 for superfine Indiana, Illinois and Iowa; \$7 15@\$7 50 for extra do., \$7 25@\$7 50 for common to good extra Ohio. \$7 80@\$8 75 for good to choice extra do., \$8 25@\$10 25 for St. Louis brands, and \$7 15@\$10 15 for extra Georgia. Canadian Flour is 5c. lower and is in limited supply; the demand is fair for the city and Eastern trade; the sales are 350 bbls. at \$6 75@\$6 90 for superfine, and \$7 15@\$8 75 for extra do. Southern Flour is in request for the home and West India trade, and is held with great firmness; the sales are 3,200 bbls. at \$7 50@\$7 80 for mixed to good brands Baltimore, etc., and \$7 85@\$8 50 for favorite fancy and extra brands. Rye Flour is in demand at better prices; the sales are 370 bbls. at \$4 20@\$4 60. Corn Meal is very firm; sales of 900 bbls. at \$4 for Jersey and \$4 25 for Brandeis, and small lots at \$4 50; Punchers \$1 97@\$1 95.

**FISH**—Dry Cod are in moderate request and prices rule firmly; further sales of some 1,300 qts. George's, have been effected at \$4 37 1/2. Mackerel are still in light stock and are very firmly held at \$1 4, and \$1 13 for medium Nos. 1 and 2.

**GRAIN**—The supply of Wheat is still below the wants of our millers, and for good and prime qualities a further advance of 2c. per bushel is paid; the sales are 2,300 bush. at \$1 65@\$1 90 for fair to good White Missouri; 2,300 bush. Red Illinois at \$1 60 for poor; 5,500 bush. good to prime Canadian Club at \$1 57@\$1 60, and 6,700 bush. White Canadian at \$1 65@\$1 83 for inferior to good. Rye is quite unsettled, and is nominal at \$1 10@\$1 12. Barley and Barley Malt are dull and nominal. Oats are less active; the business is confined to small lots; we quote \$5 25@\$6 25 for State, and \$5 25@\$7 10 for Western; the latter are extreme rates. Corn is in good request, and, with limited arrivals, is \$2 2c. better; the demand is mainly for the home trade and the East; sales of 3,000 bush. at \$1 25@\$1 50; for Western Mixed in store, \$1 25@\$1 63 for Southern white and yellow; round yellow is nominal.

**GUNNY-BAGS AND CLOTH**—At Boston sales were made of 340 bags of Gunny-Bags at 11c. each. There was some inquiry for Cloth, but no sales were made. Here there is very little doing in Bags; last sales of Cloth (heavy) at 13c., 6 mos.

**HIDES**—Continue dull and depressed, with further arrivals today and a large stock on hand.

**HOPS**—Continue very firm but quiet at 7 1/2c. for common to choice Eastern and Western. Old are steady at 4 1/2c.

**HAY**—The supply is better; the demand is fair; sales of 600 bales at \$3 25@\$4 100.

**IRON**—Scotch Pig remains quiet at \$33 2/3@\$35, 6 mos., for whole and small parcels.

**LEATHER**—There is no change in either Hemlock or Oak; the market is rather heavy.

**LIME**—Rockland is inactive; last sales of common at 37c., and Lump at \$1 20.

**MOLASSES** is dull, and appears heavy.

**NAVAL STORES**—Spirits Turpentine is in limited request, pending the steamer's news from the other side, which did not, however, come to hand in time to have any perceptible effect on prices; the sales comprise 100 bbls. in shipping order at 5ic. each; some 600 bbls. just arrived were sold previously, and are being delivered. In Crude there is nothing transpiring; the stock is still light, and prices are sustained. Common Rosin is in fair request; sales of 300 bbls. at \$1 90@\$1 95 in delivered alongside the vessel, and 2,000 bbls. do. at \$1 75, also delivered. Of No. 2 or Strained Rosin, we note sales of 300 bbls. at \$2 12 1/2@\$1 50. The medium and fine grades are quiet, but very firmly held; some very handsome specimens of the new crop have been received to-day, which are held at very high figures. Tar is in good supply, and is in very limited demand; prices are somewhat nominal. Pitch is quiet, but firm.

**OILS**—Lined oil is steady and in moderate request; sales of 7,000 gallons at 30c. and 2,000 do. on private terms. Crude Whale is steady and in fair request; sales of 1,750 bbls. inferior of the Swift's cargo 63c. Trade Sperm is still dull and heavy; sales 200 bbls. on speculation at \$1 25@\$1 gallon for export. Lard Oil is slowly recovering from the general inactivity; sales 1,200 gallons extra Western Winter at \$1 20, 4 months, and 1,000 gallons do. handsome but not extra at \$1 13, cash. Cotton Seed is in fair request at \$1 25@\$1 65, cash, and 4 months for refined; sales 3,000 gallons to go to Philadelphia, \$1 03 6 months. Red Oil is quiet at 60c@63c. cash, and \$1 25@2c. cash and 4 months for Specified; other kinds have not varied.

**PROVISIONS**—The market is again \$2 10c. better for Mess Pork, and buoyant for Prime; the arrivals are limited, and the trade are buying quite freely; the sales are 1,000 bbls. at \$2 20@\$2 50 for Mess, and \$1 95@\$1 95 30 for Prime. Beef is buoyant, the receipts limited, and the stock reduced; sales of 400 bbls. at \$1 40@\$1 65 for Country Mess; \$1 15@\$1 17 for repacked Cleveland and Chicago Mess, and \$1 75@\$1 85 for extra do. Prime Mess is quiet; the supply is very limited; we quote \$2 25@\$3 1. Beef Ham are dull; sales of 50 bbls. good Western at \$2 20. Cut Meats are firm; the arrivals of Shoulders are limited; sales of 150 bbls. at \$1 25@\$1 25 for Shoulders, and 100@11c. for Hams in salt. Lard is firmly held; the arrivals are light, and the inquiry moderate; sales of 320 bbls. and tcs. at \$1 14@\$1 14. Bacon is very scarce, and is wanted at 11 1/2@13c. Butter is in fair request, and is more plenty; sales of Ohio at 18@22c., and State at 19@24c. Cheese is more plenty; sales of common at 26@30c., and fair to good at 10 1/2@11 1/2c.

RICE is firm; sales of 200 tcs. at 4 1/2c. for common to prime.

**SUGARS**—Buyers and sellers continue looking at each other, the former would like to come forward at 1 cent reduction, the latter with the aid of Brokers and an impudent coaxing expect to bring them to their views; the sales are unimportant. By auction, 735 boxes Havana at \$1 20@10c.

**SALT PETER**—At Boston there have been sales of 950 bags crude at 7 1/2c. 4 1/2c. 6 mos.

**SPERMACETI**—We notice further sales of 1,000 lb refined at 40c., cash, for export.

**TEAS** are quiet; the offerings furnish a very poor selection.

**TALLOW**—The demand is moderate; prices are much the same; sales of 12,000 lb at 11c. cash. Refined Fat is quiet at 7 1/2c.

**WHISKY**—The market is inactive, and is nominal at \$1 25@3 1/2c.

Sheep—Extra includes Coasets, and when those of inferior quality, are thrown out.

There were nine cars over the Boston and Maine Railroad, 60 over the Boston and Lowell, 120 over the Fitchburg, and 23 over the Western, loaded with cattle, sheep, swine and horses.

**REMARKS**.—The market was quite still to-day. Owing to the few warm days the Boston market for meats has been dull, and butchers, having a good supply of live stock on hand, were not disposed to buy unless at a decline of 50@75c. per cwt. Spring Lambs dull at present prices; drovers will lose on those they have on hand; they must buy at lower prices to sell ready. Not more than half the number of Calves that there was last week; prices about the same. J. B. Cook, esq., had a carload of Cows and Calves from Kentucky.

### Philadelphia Cattle Market.....MAY 27.

There was a much better supply of Beef Cattle yesterday and to-day than the week previous, still the number offered is not sufficient to have the effect of reducing the price.

**BEF CATTLE**—The entire number sold amounted to 950 head, at prices varying from \$11 to \$125, \$131, and as high as \$14@ \$100. and but few were sold at the lowest rate. The butchers are loud in their complaint of high prices, and intend to hold a meeting on Monday next for the purpose of adopting some measure to reduce the rates.

**SWEEP**—This market was very well supplied, though not beyond the demand; the sales amounted to 4,050 head, at from \$5 to \$7 1/2c. gross.

**HOGS**—The demand for Swine continues good, and the sales this week amounted to 1,800 head, at prices ranging from \$8 to \$9 and \$9@ \$100. as in quality.

**COWS AND CALVES**—There has been but little change in this market, the sales having reached 375 head, at from \$20 to \$30 for Dry Cows, and from \$40 to \$60 for Milk Cows, with Calves by their side.
