

LATER FROM CENTRAL AMERICA.

COL. TITUS IN THE FIELD—MORE SEVERE FIGHTING—THE AMERICANS VICTORIOUS.

New Orleans, Feb. 11. By the arrival of the steamer Tennessee, we have later advices from Nicaragua. Col. Titus, lately of Kansas, and Lockridge went up the river, attacked, and defeated 300 Costa Ricans, at Codigo Point, sustaining a trifling loss. The steamer getting out of order was sent back to Punta Arenas, for repairs. Col. Titus returned up the river. It was believed that the enemy's loss in the battle was large.

Dates from Gen. Walker to the 3d, per Orizaba, via Panama, state that the enemy under Covas had appeared in the neighborhood of Rivas. On the 28th ult., Gen. Henningson with a force of 400 attacked 1,500 of the enemy, driving them from their position, and then advanced towards Rivas.

Walker's whole force consists of 1,300 men, 1,100 of whom are fit for duty—all in excellent health and spirits, with provisions and ammunition for three months.

Private despatches from the agent of the Associated Press at Arenas confirm the above.
