participate in the state's major demonstration.

Demonstration co-ordinator Manuel Fernandez said the Cuban refugees are particularly upset about the conference because the United States delegation has not declared itself for or against the lifting of the sanctions.

"We will stop all businesses, workers will not go to work, students will not go to school to show the free world that we are alive and that we don't accept coexistence," he said. "We would like to live with Cuba, but without Castro."
