HIS EIGHTIETH BIRTHDAY. An Interesting Sketch of the Career e Robert Purvis.

Saturday evening about 7 o'clock there was Mr. Robert Purvis, the distinguished antislavery agitator, is eighty years old today. He and John G. Mr. Purvis now resides in Philadelphia, but is well known in this city, where he has frequently delivered public addresses. Hit son, Dr. Chas, B. Purvis, holds the position of physician in charge of Freedman's Hospitals The Philadelphia Press yesterday gave the fole lowing pen sketch of the personal appearance of the octogenarian:

"Erect, eloquent and engaging, proud of the blood that still sweeps vigorously through his veins, the great Philadelphia anti-slavery egttator enters into the octogenarian period of his
life with a screnity born of the victorious cessation of blood-sweat strife for his fellow man
and in a peace strange in contrast with the
fifty years of agonizing struggle in his youth
and middle age. And who is Robert Purvis? A
colored man, as, the phrase goes; a gentle,
sweet-natured, dovable, handsome, silvertongued old colored man, with a skin so fair
that a Spanish beauty might envy it; a face so
reduced and a manner so gracious and cultured
that a scholar or post might desire it; a history
so remarkable that many of the greatest men
in this world would gladly exchange for
theirs could the records of time be changed.
What has Robert Purvis been? An impassioned agitator, with a tongue of scorching
flame and a heart filled with human love; a
man who has faced death, shared in the dangers of riot; a man who gave, up the certain tator enters into the octogenarian period of his man who has faced death, shared in the dangers of riot; a man who gave, up the certain enjoyment of honor and wealth abroad and stooped to lift his people from their miseries; the intimate triend of Garrison, Sumner, Phillips, Whittier, John Brown; a man who knew the great Wilberforce, Clarkson, Lafayette, But more than all this Robert Purvis was the president of the underground railway and sent inundreds of escaping slaves to security in Canada. And now he and John G. Whittier are the only survivors of the famous entislavery convention that met in Philadelphia December 4, 1833. All the others, fifty-eight in number, have died."

Mr. Purvis has lived in Philadelphia since he was nine years old. He was born in Charless ton, S.C., August 4, 1810. He inherited wealth, which chabled him to render effective service in the cause of the oppressed of his race.

They entered the stretch nearly together, Jack having all the advantage there was. It was a great race home. But Palo Alto could not keep up with Jack, the gelding winning in 2.15½ by three-quarters of a length, with Palo Alto's nose on his flank, Mutuals paid \$12.80. the second heat were three to five against Palo
