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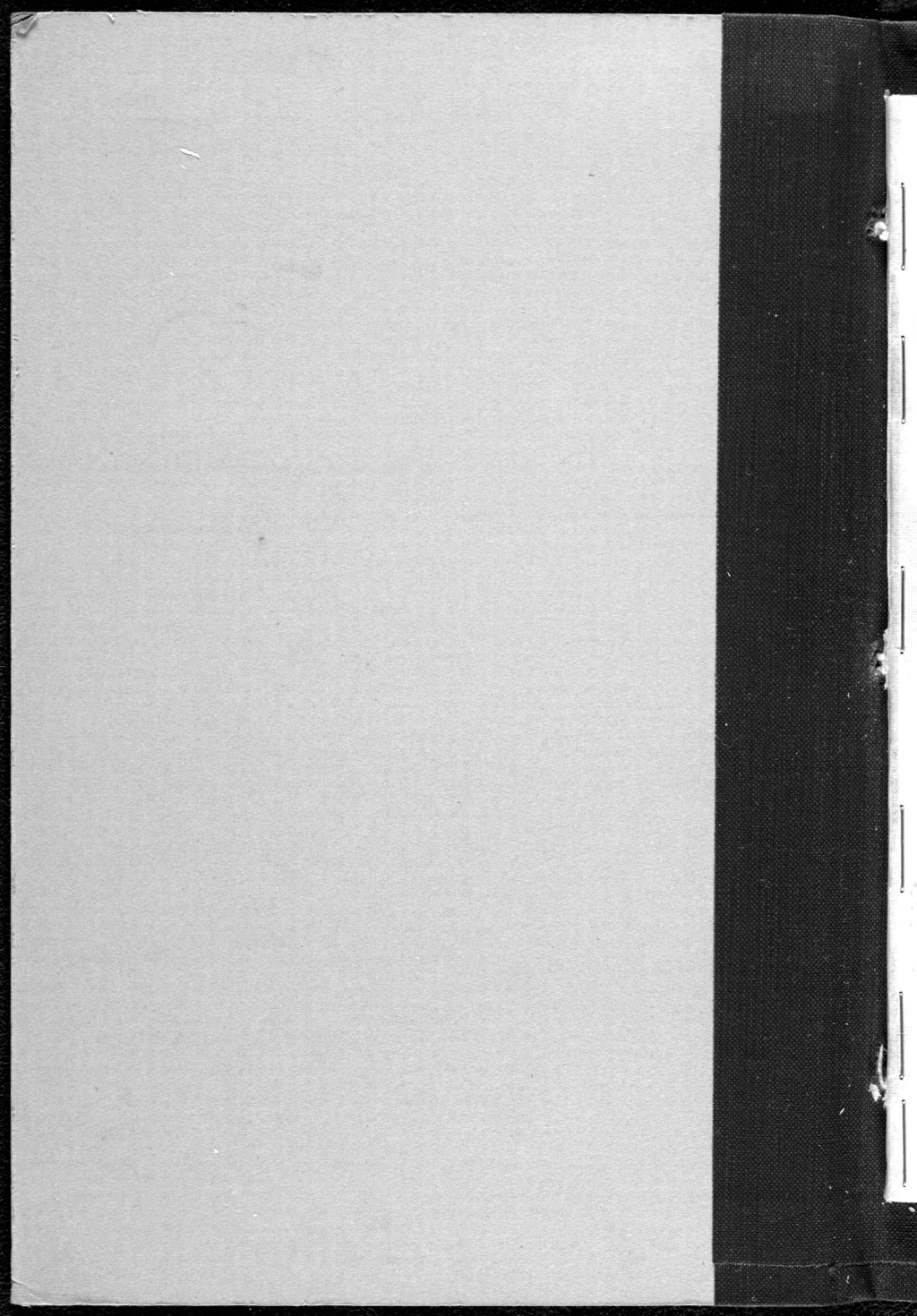

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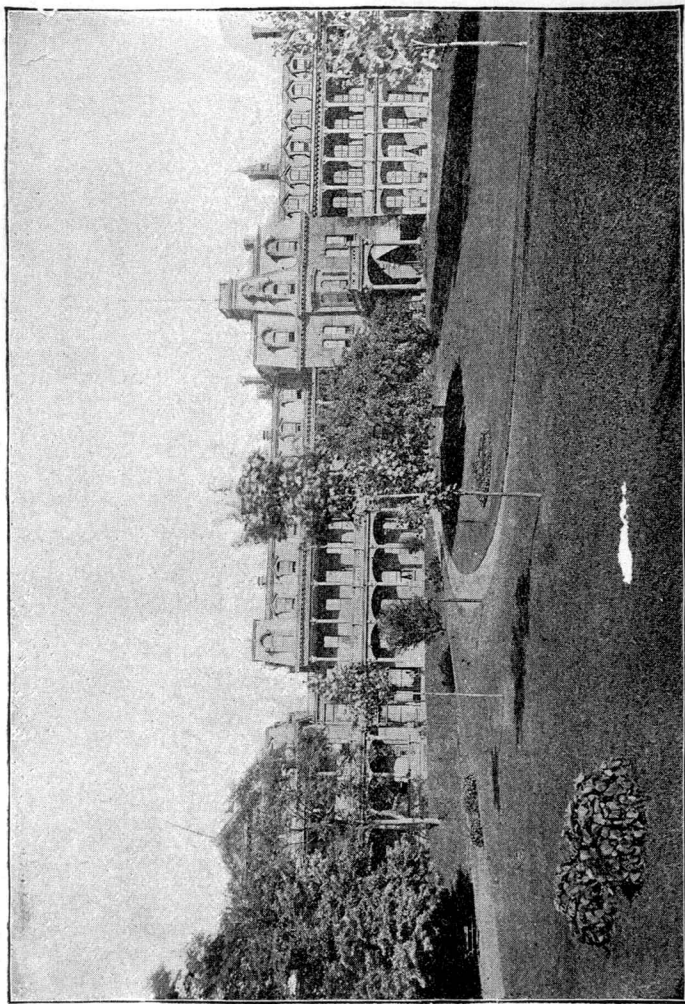

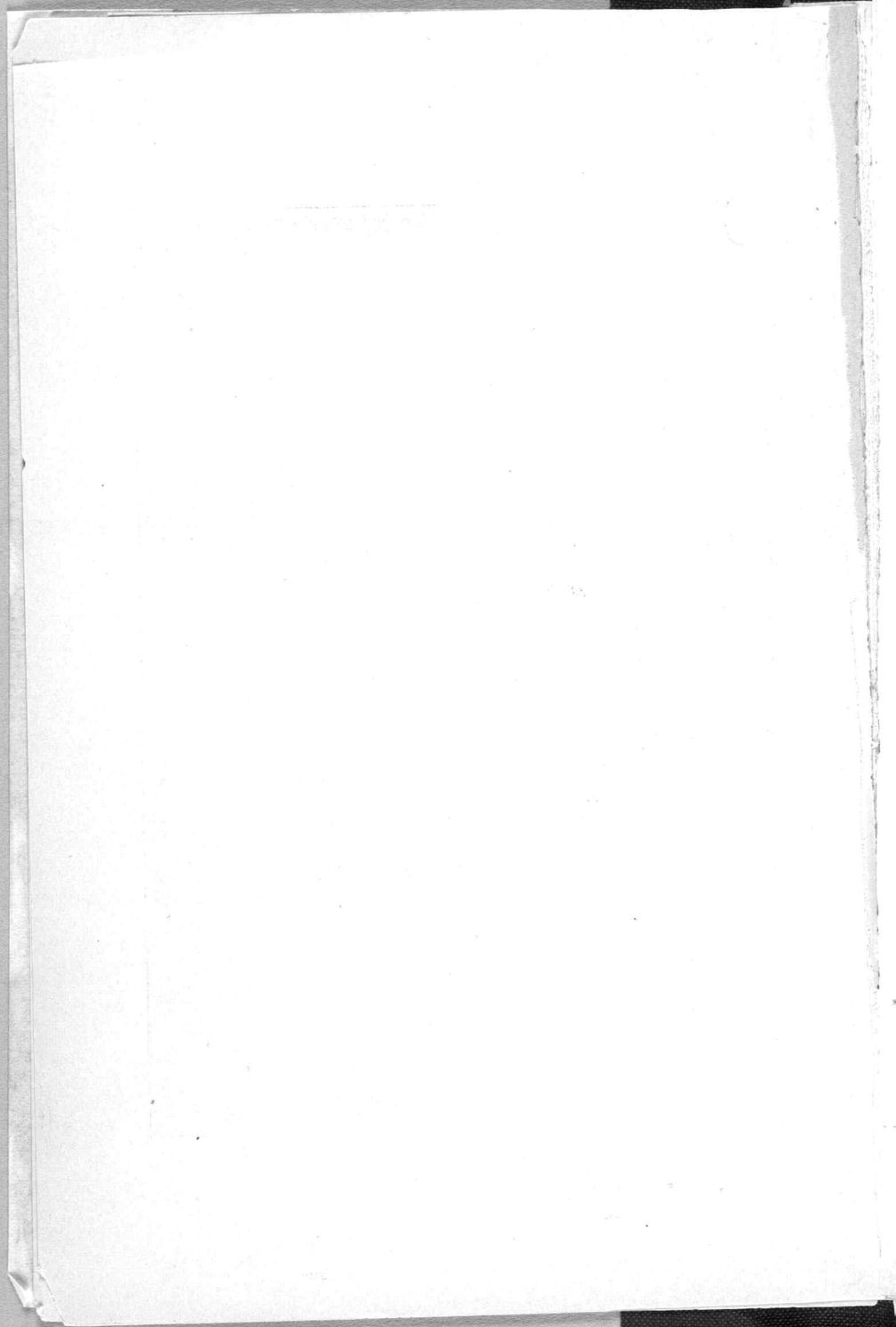

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THE
HOME FOR INCURABLES

IS located on North Third Avenue (which is a continuation of Third Avenue, New York City) and 182d Street, occupying some twelve acres of ground, well laid out and peculiarly adapted for its uses, having a frontage on each of the four sides; the buildings situated as if in a park, surrounded by shade trees—thus affording a complete retreat, where those afflicted may enjoy the shade and sunlight without annoyance. The buildings are complete in every respect, and perfect ventilation is secured.

The payment of \$5,000 in one sum secures a FREE BED in perpetuity.

Pay Patients are received at \$7.00 per week and upwards, according to care and attention required.

ANNUAL MEETING

OF THE

SOCIETY OF THE HOME FOR INCURABLES.

The Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Society of the Home for Incurables was held on Saturday, June 11th, 1892, in the Chapel; Mr. E. A. Quintard in the chair, Mr. McLaren acting as Secretary.

Prayer being offered by the Chaplain, the Rev. Mr. Derbyshire, the proceedings of the previous Annual Meeting were read by the Secretary and duly approved. The Annual Reports of the Board of Managers presented and read by Mr. Abner W. Colgate; the Treasurer, Mr. George Sherman; the Medical Superintendent, Dr. Israel C. Jones, and the Chaplains, the Revs. A. J. Derbyshire, S. T. B., and Thomas R. Harris, D. D.

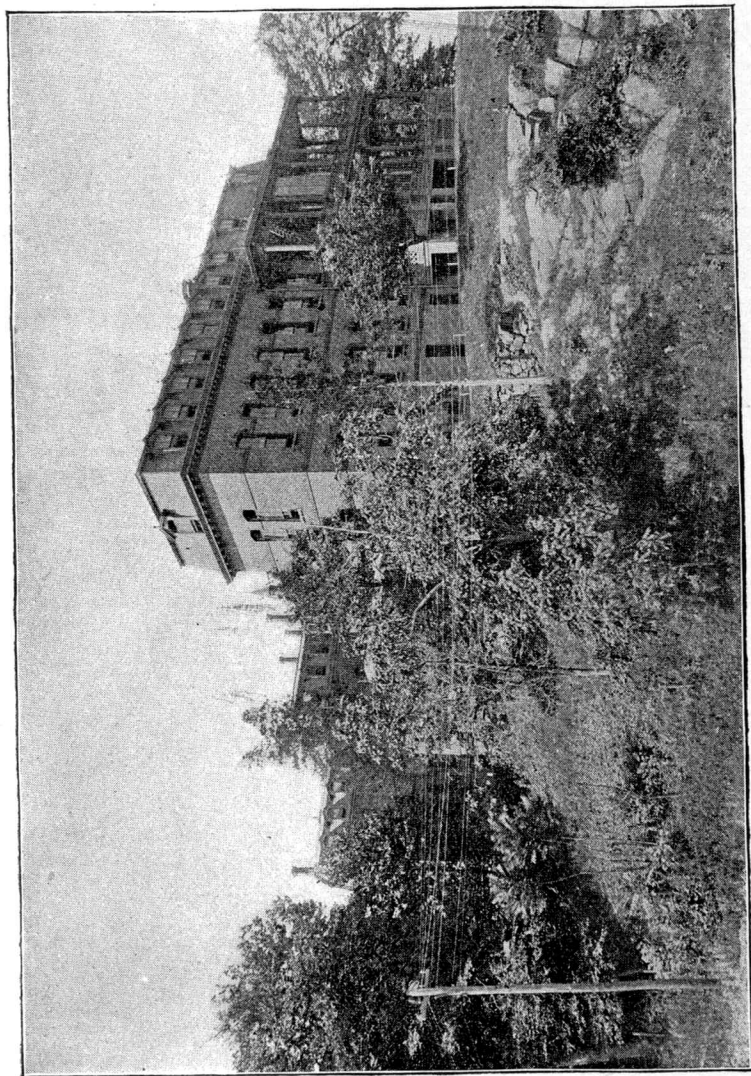

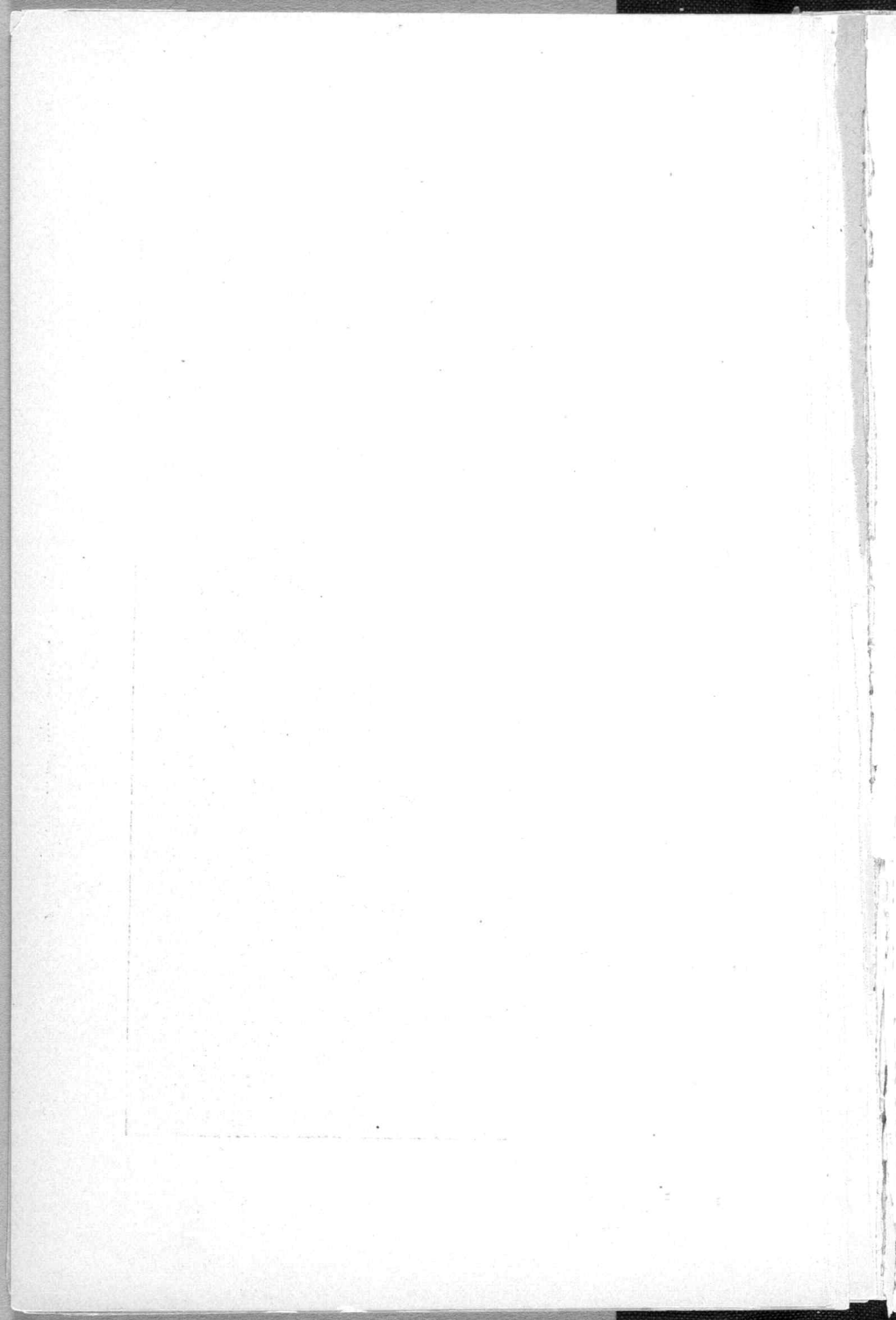

TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

HOME FOR INCURABLES.

The work of the past year shows that the Home has been well maintained in all its departments. Its scope is gradually enlarging, and if the expenses are also increasing from year to year, we feel well assured that its usefulness and the amount of work accomplished are increasing in a still greater ratio.

It was originally founded in response to a long-felt want. All the other hospitals and charitable institutions in and about New York, twenty-five years ago, were for curative purposes only. For those who were *incurable*, there was no place. Such unfortunates had to be taken care of, as best they could, by friends who usually lacked the proper facilities and experience.

This it is that distinguishes this Institution from all others in our community; and it is for the maintenance of this peculiar work that we feel justified, year after year, in commending it to the benevolent, for it is a work that cannot go backward. As far as pay-patients go, it is self-supporting, but it is impossible to confine the work to pay-patients. There are always

a large number whose condition recommends them strongly to our care, whom it is hard to turn away from our doors, and yet who are unable and whose friends are unable to meet the cost of their maintenance, small as this is.

It was a prominent idea in the plans of our original founders, and the same idea has ever since prevailed in our councils, that we must provide not only for those who are able to pay, but also, as far as the means contributed will allow, for such applicants as are wholly or partly without means. Our great prosperity during some years past, has led many to suppose that our endowments are sufficient to provide for all the applicants of this class, and in consequence of this erroneous impression our contribution list has fallen off of late. Thus we are prevented from enlarging our list of free and partly free-patients, so that what has always been one of the chief objects of our work is, in a measure, defeated. And it is for this reason that we again appeal this year, as in years past, to the charitable, that this part of our work may continue to increase, feeling sure that the blessing of God will be upon our work in proportion as we help those who cannot help themselves.

Our present accommodation for patients is about 185, and usually our beds are all filled. At present we have six male patients whose admission has been approved of, but who are still on the waiting list. Our annual expenses are about fifty-five thousand

dollars, while our receipts this year, as will be seen from our Treasurer's Report, are several thousand dollars short of this. Our resources are derived from the pay of patients, from interest on investments, and from the contributions of regular subscribers and others. The legacies occasionally received cannot be directly applied to the running expenses, unless it is so specified in the bequest, but are always invested and the interest only used. The maintenance and repair of our buildings, grounds, etc., are also charged to our regular expense account, except when a special fund is raised for the erection of a new building or some permanent improvement.

As to the general working of this Institution too much praise cannot be accorded to our Ladies' Board, who, during this and many previous years, have managed all the practical details. There are many matters which the Board of Trustees could not very well attend to which are thoroughly looked after by this committee of large hearted and able women. They not only supply the linen room, at an annual cost to themselves of about twelve hundred dollars, but the working of the kitchens, the care of the clothing, the general tidiness and cleanliness of the rooms and wards and many such things are left entirely to their kindly supervision; and how well this is done may be seen by any one who will walk through the buildings. But no one knows, and no one ever will know, the countless little acts of

christian charity and loving care which have brightened the lives and smoothed the dying pillows of many of these poor sufferers.

During the past year Dr. Archibald M. Campbell, who has been connected with the Home from the beginning and has been our regular visiting physician since 1876, has resigned his position, but still continues with us as a consulting physician. We can never sufficiently express our gratitude to Dr. Campbell for the long years of faithful service which he has given us. Dr. Israel C. Jones, who has served us most faithfully and continuously for sixteen years as Superintendent, has been advanced to the post of Medical Superintendent, combining his former duties with those of Dr. Campbell, and being assisted in this work by Dr. J. Vernon Smith. All who are acquainted with the Home and have followed its progress for the larger period of its career, know better than we can here describe how much of its success has been owing to the careful and conscientious labors of Dr. Jones and the co-operation of Dr. Campbell.

During the past year the old laundry, situated immediately in the rear of the main building and immediately over the boilers, was condemned by the Building Department and we were ordered to take it down. It was decided to replace it by a three story brick building, covering the boiler room by a fire-proof floor, thus rendering the whole structure practically fire-proof. In addition to the enlarged

laundry facilities, the upper floor will provide sleeping accommodation for fifteen or twenty nurses and servants, who are now lodged in the main building. This work, with some additions to the laundry apparatus, plumbing, etc., and also some additional fire-escapes ordered by the department to be placed on the main building, will bring the cost up to nearly twenty thousand dollars. It is expected to be ready for occupation in July of this year. It is an improvement that has long been needed; it adds greatly to the safety of all our buildings; and enables us also to devote more space to patients in the main building, now otherwise occupied. It is a large outlay, perhaps, but the call for it was imperative, and it is also a good illustration of the growth of our work and shows the inadequacy of much of the equipment that answered well enough a dozen years ago.

The thanks of the Board of Managers are due to the many friends who have helped us in many ways during the past year, and their various gifts are duly acknowledged in another part of this Report. We cannot help, however, making special allusion to the most thoughtful liberality of Mrs. Anson Phelps Stokes, who during the past Summer furnished a carriage with horses and driver daily for the use of the Institution, so that our infirm and feeble patients could all, in turn, enjoy an occasional drive. This lady has recently had a very comfortable six-seated vehicle built expressly for this purpose and presented

it to the Home, and also defrays the expense of a permanent driver and a team of horses for the season. It is not merely the generosity of such a gift which touches us, so much as the kindly thoughtfulness which has studied out the various requirements of the afflicted, and the best means of relieving the weary monotony of their lives by an occasional healthful diversion.

We have received during the year the very generous legacy of the late Mr. John T. Farrish, amounting to Fifty Thousand Dollars, for investment. Mr. Farrish also founded one of our Free Beds in perpetuity, and for many years he and Mrs. Farrish have been generous givers to the Home.

We have also received from other estates the following legacies: Thomas Hope, \$5,000; Sarah Burr (residuary), \$4,000; Harriet Flint, \$1,776; and Cornelia E. Cairns, \$500. We have also been mentioned in the wills of the late Mrs. Robert L. Stuart, and the late Mr. William Astor. Free Beds in perpetuity have also been established by Mr. Henry F. Spaulding and Mrs. Richard T. Auchmuty.

By the death of Mr. Jacob D. Vermilye, which occurred on the first day of the present year, we sustained a severe loss. Mr. Vermilye became a member of our Board of Managers in 1868, and the following year was appointed Treasurer, in which office he served continuously until 1884, when, partly from the pressure of other duties and partly on

account of failing health, he resigned, but continued as a member of the Board until his death. We all remember his excellent qualities, as a courteous christian gentleman, an upright man of business and a generous giver. During his long and busy life-time, he ranked as one of the ablest financiers of this city, and our own Institution has profited again and again by his sound and conservative advice. At a subsequent meeting of the Board, appropriate resolutions were passed, which are embodied in this Report.

The religious needs of our patients are not neglected, and as will be seen from the report of our chaplains, the Rev. Drs. Derbyshire and Harris. Regular services are held in the chapel, and much spiritual consolation, we can firmly hope, has been given to the sick and the dying.

The detailed work of the year is shown at length in the reports of the Superintendent and others which follow this.

With heartfelt gratitude to our Heavenly Father for all the mercies of the past year, we would again thank all those who have in any way helped us, and as this work not only goes on but grows continually, we hope they will not be weary in well-doing.

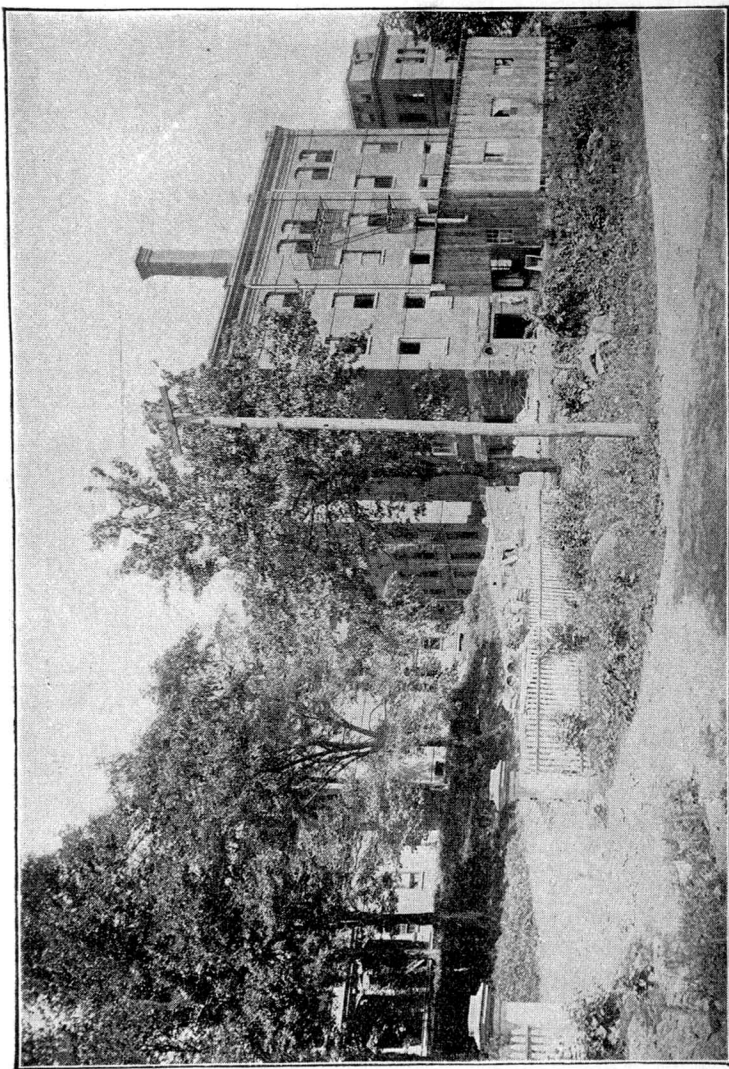

REPORT

— OF —

THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

The undersigned respectfully submits the following as the Twenty-sixth Annual Report of the Administrative and Medical Department of the Home for Incurables.

On the first day of June, 1891, the whole number of patients in the Home was—males, 84; females, 91; total, 175.

The admissions during the year have been—males, 46; females, 31; total, 77.

The discharges have been—males, 12; females, 14; total, 26.

The deaths during the same period have been—males, 23; females, 20; total, 43.

The number under our care during the year has been—males, 128; females, 124; total, 252.

The number in the Home June 1st, 1892, is—males, 93; females, 90; total, 183.

Of the 252 patients in the Home during the year, 42 were free patients, 11 were life patients, 24 occupied life free beds, and 17 occupied endowed beds. The remainder were in part or entirely pay patients.

Our daily average has been 177. Average time of residence in the Home, 255 days.

Of the 26 patients discharged, 2 were sent out cured, 11 were very much improved, 3 were transferred to asylums for the insane, and 10 were discharged unimproved.

It will be seen by the foregoing that the number of deaths has been less than for several years, the percentage being $17\frac{1}{16}$.

The male side of our House has been full for several months, thus crippling our ability to receive numerous applicants who have applied for admission.

Many of these could not wait for vacancies to occur. Of those who were so situated that they could wait, we have a long list on our book of applications, and we hope to be able to accommodate them within the next month or two, but in the mean time new applications are coming in.

We very much need one more pavilion for the accommodation of worthy and deserving patients. Such a patient we have now waiting for admission; a little fellow, 13 years old, suffering from a broken back, bed sores, etc., shut up in the close confines of a hot and noisy city, waiting anxiously and praying for an opportunity to be received within the walls of our cool, comfortable and quiet Home.

All that is necessary to be done to relieve us of our inability to receive these unfortunate sufferers is for some wealthy lady or gentleman to contribute the amount required for the erection of a new pavilion.

What a grand monument of charity to be named after the doner this would be!

Of the kindness of our Ladies' Board enough can not be said. They are untiring in their visits and works for the good of the Home and the comfort of its inmates.

Mrs. Anson Phelps Stokes has given to the Home an elegant and most comfortable carriage, and the use of a team of horses and driver, to take our invalids out riding. It is scarcely necessary to say that this is one of the greatest aids to the physicians in the care of the class of patients received in our Home.

Our friends, professional and non-professional of the outside world, have been very kind to us during the past Winter, having given us many enjoyable entertainments.

Our new laundry building will be ready for occupancy about the middle of July. When finished, it will be one of the most complete laundries in this city. To our able assistant, Dr. J. Vernon Smith, is due special commendation for his ability as a professional man, and his unswerving fidelity to the discharge of his duties.

With grateful appreciation to the Board of Managers for favors shown us in the past, and in granting requests for promoting the welfare of the Home, and with a most earnest desire that even much

more may be accomplished in the coming year, we remain

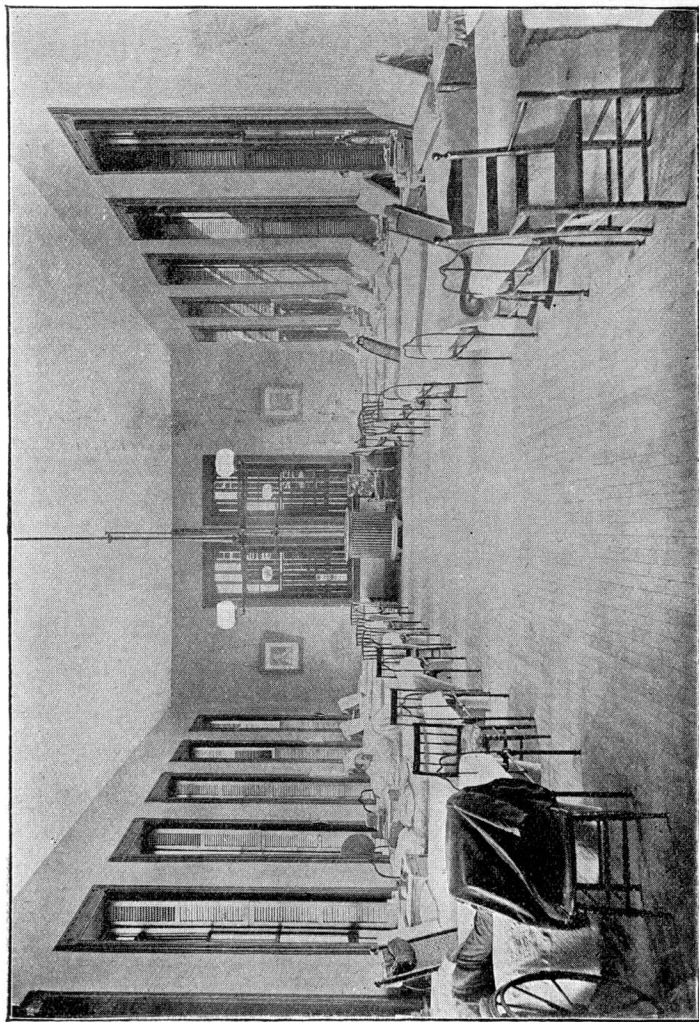

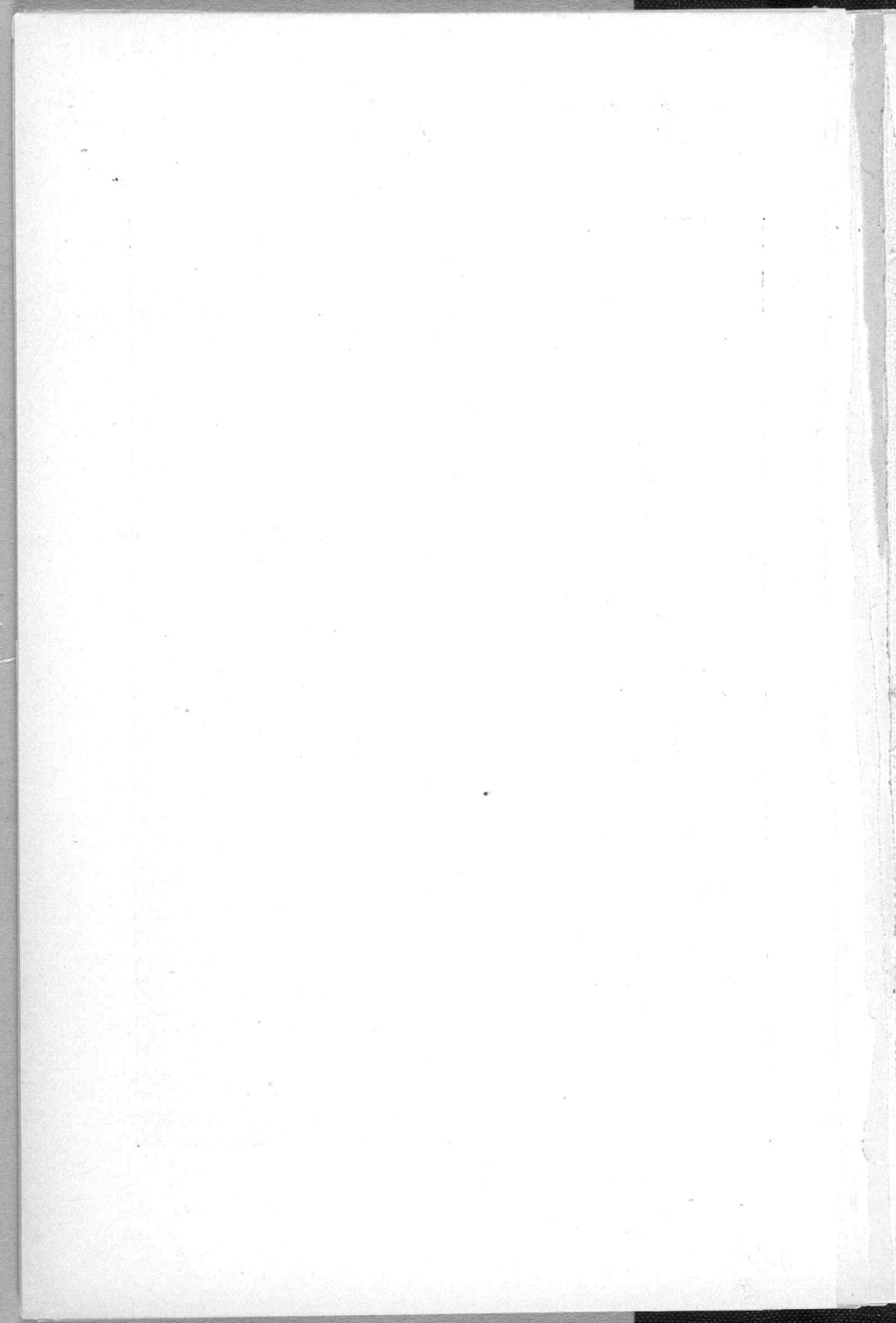

REPORT OF THE CHAPLAINS,

To the Honorable Board of Managers of the Home for Incurables.

GENTLEMEN: It becomes our pleasing duty once more to submit to you our Annual Report as Chaplains of the Home for Incurables. It is a very difficult matter, in a report like this, to give an adequate idea of the nature and results of a work such as this is. Having to do with the moral and spiritual nature of those committed to our care and not with the body, its results are often unknown to man, though well known to God, in whose name and for whose glory we labour, and with whom we all have to do. We have endeavoured to perform our duties with earnestness and zeal, and to bring to these stricken and afflicted ones the inspiring helpfulness and comfort of the Gospel of Christ Jesus, our crucified Lord and Master. From room to room, from ward to ward, from bed to bed, we go, comforting, cheering and strengthening these little ones, in the endurance of their trials, and striving to lift up their minds more and more from earthly to heavenly things. What gracious results have followed upon our labours are known fully to Him, in whose name we are privileged to minister, but we have many

assurances that His blessing has been abundantly bestowed upon our efforts. To Him be all the glory and the praise.

Services have been held in the Chapel every Wednesday, Friday and Sunday throughout the year, unless when sickness has hindered. The Holy Communion has been celebrated in the Chapel monthly, and on all the great festivals of the christian year ; and in private as often as circumstances required. The attendance of the patients at these various services and their interest in them has been increasingly encouraging. Two persons have been baptized. The Burial Office has been read as often as required.

In bringing the report to a close, we desire to express our sincere appreciation of the uniform kindness, courtesy and co-operation of the esteemed Superintendent of the Home, Dr. I. C. Jones, and also to acknowledge the efficient and helpful labours of the Ladies' Board.

A "HOME" FOR THAT LARGE CLASS OF
SUFFERERS WHOSE DISEASES ARE
PRONOUNCED INCURABLE.

While the persons themselves, though in many instances quite poor, are, in refinement, education and social position, and, above all, religious character, so far removed from the pauper class that no Christian mind can for a moment bear the thought of dismissing them to the public charities.

Of such patients, some are received and provided for gratuitously, their support becoming a charge upon the resources of the Home ; while others are paid for either by their friends or from their own means—the usual charge being \$7 per week, though a higher rate is fixed for patients whose condition makes it necessary to place them in a separate room and to give them the extra attention of a nurse.

Board money must be paid eight weeks in advance.

Application for the admission of patients should be made to the Superintendent, from whom blank forms of application may be obtained.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

All patients admitted to the "Home" will be required to conform to its regulations, and to conduct themselves with due propriety toward each other.

Patients are forbidden to use profane or indecent language, to express immoral or infidel sentiments, to play at any game for money, or to smoke in the house, except in such places as may be designated.

The use or introduction of spirituous liquors or medicines into the building by the patients is strictly forbidden, except when ordered by the physician.

No male patient shall go into any of the female apartments, nor any female patient into any of the male apartments.

Patients are forbidden to deface the walls of the house, the furniture, bedding, or any article belonging to the Home.

Patients are required to be in their rooms at 8.30 P. M., during the months from October to April, inclusive, and at 9.30 from April to October, at which time the house must be quiet, and all lights will be extinguished thirty minutes thereafter.

The Home is open for the reception of friends and for other visitors every day, except Sundays, between the hours of 11 A. M. and 5 P. M. Persons wishing to see patients (at other times) must, in all cases, obtain permission at the office before going into the wards.

The friends of patients, unless specially summoned—as they will be when a real necessity exists—are not admitted upon Sundays.

Patients are required to conform strictly to the foregoing rules and regulations, and to obey the orders of the Superintendent.

Prayer of the Incurables.

ALMIGHTY GOD and merciful FATHER, we come to Thee in humble dependence on Thy power and with full faith in Thine infinite mercy and boundless loving kindness. We pray Thee to give us all pardon of our sins. Fill our minds, we beseech Thee, with a sense of Thy presence, and make our service not only a service of our lips, but the offering also of our grateful and earnest hearts. Bless the managers, officers, and all the helpers who labor together in the welfare of this home. Especially bless, O LORD, the benefactors of this charity, if they have reverently and faithfully of their substance given unto Thee. Remember them in love. Let Thy favors rest continually on them and on their families. Give them health, both of body and of mind, and Thy peace now and forever.

We pray also for the patients of this house. God of the sorrowful we bring them unto Thee. Graciously look upon them with the eyes of Thy mercy; and inasmuch as all things are possible with Thee, if it should be Thy will, even yet restore them to health of body and soundness and strength of mind, that they may walk for the remainder of their days in the light of this mercy and speak thankfully of Thy love. Give patience, O LORD, give patience and quiet and loving submissiveness to Thy will to those most sorely visited. Hold them, O blessed SAVIOUR, in the arms of Thy tender compassion. Comfort them and give them Thy grace abundantly. Fit them for life, and in life prepare them for dwelling where there is no sighing nor pain; where none say, "I am sick;" where GOD himself shall wipe away all tears from all faces.

We ask for all these mercies, in the name of our precious and only SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST. *Amen.*

Extract from By-Laws.

The Order of Business at meetings of the Board shall be as follows :

1. At the hour appointed for the meeting of the Board, or as soon thereafter as a quorum ("any seven" managers "shall form a quorum."—Constitution, Art. V.) shall appear, the Chair shall be taken by the President, and the business opened with prayer.
2. The roll shall then be called and the attending members noted.
3. The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read, and, if necessary, corrected.
4. Monthly statement of the Treasurer.
5. Monthly report of the Superintendent.
6. Communications to the Board shall be received and considered.
7. Reports of the Committee shall be called for, and order taken thereon.
8. The unfinished business of the former meeting (if any) shall be taken up, after which any business may be proceeded with at the pleasure of the Board.

LOCATION.

The building occupied as the "Home" is located at Fordham, 24th Ward, New York City. It is reached by the cars of either the Harlem Railroad to Fordham, or by the East Side Elevated Railroad to Harlem, thence by Suburban Elevated Road or Fordham Horse-car.

There will, consequently, be needed a constant supply of home comforts, among which may be named the following articles: books, engravings, games, flowers, fruits, vegetables, sewing materials, clothing, etc., etc. Sewing societies, or parties who may contemplate working for the benefit of the institution will be gladly furnished with lists of such articles as are most needed by addressing the Superintendent.
