

## **P. B. Randolph at the Opera House.**

Some thirty or forty individuals assembled at the Opera House yesterday afternoon, to hear the oration of P. B. Randolph of Boston. His subject was—"Amazons, or Women in Politics," and was treated by the speaker in his peculiar manner, in a lengthy address. Mr. Randolph is no friend to the Woman Suffrage movement. His remarks were listened to with attention.

### **IN THE EVENING**

the speaker remarked, in introduction, that every one should endeavor to be, under all circumstances, master of the situation in which they find themselves placed. The arrangement for these lectures on Sunday evening, and at this season of the year, said he, was undoubtedly an error of judgment on his part, and financially, of course, a failure. He should probably have the pleasure of paying a dollar and a half a piece for the privilege of talking to each one of his audience. He then invited the sixty or seventy present to seats in front, in order that those in the rear should not have to take any good thing that might be said, at second hand. His subject—the Master Passion—was introduced by an illustration of Communism as it related to property, and finally of Communism as it related to the affections, or Free Love. This belief, he declared, was so wide-spread and powerful as to threaten the foundations of society, as they have never been threatened before during the nineteenth century. The speaker then proceeded to discuss the subject for an hour and a half, displaying an unlimited command of words, and making some good hits.
