Another of the fest lessening band of abolitionists has been taken away to the death at Chelses. of Dr William Wells Brown. His hie was not outy a record of 'soble philapthropy, but so suspiration to his race, and a striking examile of the power of man to lift himself above the most depressing surroundings. He was born a slave in Kentucky 68 years ago, but when he was 26 e-caped to the North, and worked as steward on a Lake Erie steamer.
