Was First Negro Ever Elected to Office by Popular Vote. Washington, Nov. 13-Ex-Congressmin John M. Langston of Virguita, one of the prominent colored men of the country, died here at \$250 this evening. He was 68 years of age, having been born a slave in 125. He was 81 was educated at Oberlin, where he graduated from the

theological department in 1854. He afterwards studied law and practiced his profession until 1869, during which time he held several township offices in Ohio, being the first colored man elected to office in the United States by popular vote. In 1809 he was given the protessorship of law at Howard university, remaining with that institution for seven years. From 1877 to 1885 he was United States minister and consul general to Hayti. Upon his return to this country he became president of the Virginia Normal and Collegiate institute at Petersburg. Va., where he remained for three years, when he was elected to the Fiftyfirst congress and was given his seat on a contest. Since 1891 Mr. Langston has been prominent in politics, but did not hold office
