The Murderer's Doom —We are informed by a gentleman who arrived last evening from Suffolk, that NAT TURNER was tried at Jerusalem on Saturday last, and sentenced, of course, to be hung. His execution is ordered for Friday next. We also learn that three other slaves are to be executed at the same time and place; one of them taken previously to the apprehension of Nat—the other two subsequently, and upon Nat's information.— Herald.

Grimes acquitted.—The colored preacher, JAMES GRIMES, who was committed about two months since by the examining Court, and subsequently remanded for trial before the Superior Court for Norfolk county, under an indictment of conspiring to rebel," in the late insurrection in Southampton county, was arraigned before that Court, Judge BROWNE presiding, on Saturday last. The witnesses both on the part of the Commonwealth and the prisoner being numerous, the case was considerably protracted, and the Jury did not retire until a late hour in the afternoon, not agreeing on that evening, (eleven being for acquittal and one for a verdict of guilty,) the verdict of the Jury was not rendered until Monday at noon, when the dissenting juror having come over, the prisoner was acquitted .- Beacon.
