

AN INDIAN LYNCHED. On Sunday the 21st ult, a Chippewa Indian was hung at the Falls of Chippewa, in Chippewa county, without jury or judge. On the evening previous, some difficulty took place between the Indian and a Frenchman, by the name of Marshall; of this difficulty we have not distinctly learned. About twelve o'clock at night, the Indian declared his intention to go in pursuit of Marshall and kill him. He soon found him, and pounced upon him, stabbing him twice with a large knife in the left side, inflicting wounds which were at the time supposed to be fatal. This savage act soon became known to the men about the Falls, and the Indian was pursued and overtaken about two hours after, and bound with cords for safe keeping until the next morning, (Sunday) when he was taken and hung upon a tree "by the neck until he was dead." The Indian is represented as being one of several brothers, who have been the terror not only of the whites, but of their own tribe, for some time past, and the one hung had the day before several times threatened to kill another man; and the inhabitants, deeming themselves insecure with such a savage among them, summarily lynched him.
