WASHINGTON NEWS AND GOSSIP.

THE CONDONEMENT .- Nothing since the extra ordinary acquittal of Daniel E. Sickles has so shocked the American public mind as his recent proclamation that the woman concerned in his murder of Philip Barton Key is quite worthy to be his wife, involved in the reestablishment of his marital relations with her. The difference is simply, that his acquittal under the circuit stances shocked thoughtful persons who value the due enforcement of the laws as the palladium of American liberties; while his proclamation above referred to has shocked those of weak minds, sickly sentiments, or diseased principles, who for the most part were those who shouted over his acquittal as a vindication of justice, (in their opinon.) In thus shocking them, Sickles has opened the eyes of those among them in this latitude, to the fact that the Star was correct in its estimate of his (Sickles') morate and character, from the moment of the homicide to the close of the trial.

In condoning her offence, Sickles proclaims that he was himself the author of her revolting confession; or that a woman such as she described herself to be, therein, is not unfit to be his wife; that he shot Philip Barton Key unarmed and unaware of his approach with any such intent, for an offence which he does not regard as sufficient cause for mere than a temporary estrangement between the woman and himself, she being as much a principal in the affair as the victim whose life he took in so cowardly a manner.

Now, we have to say, that a more scrupulously correct man, in such matters, than Phillip Barton Key was, until an evil hour brought him in close contact with the Sickles pair, we never knew Among all the friends of his youth and manhood here, he was proverbial for his high-toned ideas of right and wrong in such matters, before his association with them. We are aware that the partizans of the man who killed him created a different impression, for the time being, on the public Not a single point of proof to justify their misrepresentation of the original character of Key. did they adduce, however; and we rejoice that, in thus showing himself in his true colors. Sickles has opened the eyes of the dupes of his late melodramatic programme, so as to enable them to realize the fact that the aspersions showered upon Key, for his (Sickles's) benefit, were as baseless as his own claims to honor to be wounded in an affair of the sort, in which Key fell a victim to h/soriginal victim; for any young girl who becomes the wife of a man who, after extorting from her and publishing such a confession as that which all the world read and revolted at not long since, takes her again to his arms, and thus proclaims her a fit wife for bim, is, indeed, a victim, almost as much to be pitled as the man who was mur dered by and through his unfortunate association with the twain.

As mortifying as the history of the trial has been to considerate and justice-loving people of this District, as inflicting a stain upon the history of its jurisprudence never to be wiped out, this denon-ment of a condonement under the circumstances, will do some good, we trust, in teaching District of Columbia juries their duty between law and justice on one side and a vulgar bastard publie opinion manufactured for the moment by the atrical appliances to cheat law and justice, on the other. Long will this public condonement keep alive the public's memory of the jury in the Sickles case, we trust, to the end of forever deterring jurymen here who have character to lose, from venturing in the face of their oaths to administer the law as it exists, from returning a verdict according to what they think the law should be, rather than according to what they know it to be, if fit to ente the jury-box.
